Malcolm in the Middle

"Malcolm in the Middle" doesn't really look, sound, or feel like any family sitcom you've seen before. The show centers on Malcolm (Frankie Muniz), a very active, but well-meaning teen with a high IQ and a low tolerance for his weird family. It can feel like a kid's show at times, with its gross-out humor, but "Malcolm" has drawn some of its biggest audiences among men 18 to 49. That may be because of the dead-on way it shows boys picking on boys at school, at home and anywhere adults aren't watching. The show sometimes is too silly, especially in the scenes in Malcolm's school. Its clever wit make it one of the few shows that are actually funnier the more times you see it.

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As funny as the kids are, the parents are hilarious. Hal (Bryan Cranston) mostly hides behind his newspaper, though in a some episode he reveals a secret past as a roller-skating champion, complete with sequined outfit. Lois (Jane Kaczmarek) yells like a truck driver and sometimes shaves her legs in the car when her busy life doesn't allow enough time in the bathroom. Few shows so cleverly combine the line between kid-friendly comedy and sly adult satire.

Diamonds

The rough stone emerges from the African soil at mines in the war zones of Angola or straight from the dammed-up river in the Congo. After going across continents and oceans, after being graded, cut, polished and set in gold along the way, a diamond lands in a display window in Manhattan, transformed into expensive jewelry.

The journey can take months or even years. To enforce the myth that diamonds are rare and valuable, most of the world's rough stones are stock-piled in London and then carefully fed back into the world market. De Beers, the South African huge company that controls two-thirds of the world's rough diamonds, decides how many will be sold, when, to whom and at what price.

Where they are mined responsibly, as in Botswana or South Africa, diamonds can contribute to development and stability. But where governments are corrupt, rebels are vicious, as in Angola and the Congo, where the glittering stones have become agents of slave labor, murder, mass homelessness, and wholesale economic collapse.

Rescuing a Dog

Most people, when they acquire a puppy, purchase a purebred animal from a kennel or pet shop. It's true that there are many advantages to purebred dogs. Such as you know what your pup will look like when it grows up (in particular, you know how big it will be), and you have some idea of its temperament. But non-purebred dogs, commonly known as mutts, have many advantages as well.

The most important of these is health. Most people do not know that almost all breeds of dogs have genetic health problems. These range from epilepsy to tumors to malformed bones and joints. These problems arise from inbreeding, or breeding of closely related animals. Although purebred dogs mostly suffer from these ailments, mutts tend to be free from these abnormalities, so your pet is likely to stay healthy for many years.

A second advantage is the good feeling that comes from rescuing a dog. Because of severe overcrowding, animal shelters are often forced to destroy dogs that are not adopted within a short period of time, so by adopting from a shelter, you might just be saving a life.

Finally, adopting a pet is likely to be much cheaper than buying one. Shelters typically charge only a nominal adoption fee, while a purchasing a purebred can amount to hundreds of dollars. Sure, with a mutt you give up the status that comes with being able to boast about your pet's pedigree, but you also gain a healthy pet, plus the satisfaction that comes with saving a life

Leaf-cutters are a type of ant that live in huge underground nests in tropical rain forests.
